About Spokane Workforce Council: The Spokane Workforce Council (SWC) is a nonprofit organization that leads the local workforce system and invests in programs that help individuals access meaningful careers while meeting employer needs. SWC works to expand training opportunities, strengthen partnerships, and build pathways that connect people to stable employment while supporting the region's economic growth.

Grant Funds: Funds from the Northwest Business Development Association will help expand SWC's childcare impact project, Reconnect2Work. Over the past two years, SWC has invested nearly \$2 million in direct tuition assistance to help Spokane families return to work post-pandemic. This support has enabled parents to pursue training for higher-paying jobs, pay down debt to reduce monthly expenses, and gain the financial breathing room needed to make the best decisions for their families. Building on that success, this next phase of the project will create on-ramps for individuals to enter the childcare field through training, certification, and support services, while also expanding access to affordable childcare slots for Spokane families.

In addition, the funds will support a region-wide childcare needs assessment to ensure that the initiative is both data-driven and provider-led. This assessment will provide a clear picture of gaps, challenges, and opportunities across Spokane County, ensuring that resources are aligned with the real needs of families and providers. The results will also inform future policy, funding, and program design, creating long-term strategies to strengthen Spokane's childcare system and better support working families.

Funds from the Northwest Business Development Association are helping expand the one-on-one business coaching and capital readiness services, with a focus on women, veterans, people of color, and low-income entrepreneurs. Through these services, Business Impact NW will provide practical guidance, from building a business plan to understanding cash flow.

The mission is to provide students with resources so that they can reach their potential. Spokane Colleges Foundation focuses efforts on scholarships and emergency aid to its 20,000 students and program support to its 120+ programs.

About Spokane Colleges Foundation: The most impactful contributions to the students come in the form of direct financial support. The Foundation provides the funding for their tuition, books, fees, equipment, childcare, utility, bills, rent, and more. Last year, over \$461,000 was provided in this area of support. The program also provides education and training support. By having the latest equipment and technology to train with, students have a more competitive advantage entering their career fields after graduation.

More than anything else, these students are the future of Spokane's workforce. Spokane County is the largest labor market in Eastern Washington and Northern Idaho. Spokane Colleges is not only our region's only community college system, students live, study, and ultimately work *here*. They are the nurses, automotive maintenance technicians, chefs, small business owners, and teachers that Spokane interacts with every day.

<u>Grant Funds:</u> The grant funds will be going towards the *Tools for Tradespeople* pilot program for the second year in a row. The *Tools for Tradespeople* program is working specifically with machining technology students, providing the tools that they otherwise would have to purchase themselves. The program gained so much interest with potential students, that Machining has added an entire second cohort of students! However, because the original goal was to support one cohort through the two-year program, there is a gap in funding to cover these extra students. The grant funds will go towards funding the last few students joining the program, especially since more tools and spots are being added.

<u>Achievements:</u> Year 2 rocked in persistence and achieved a 100% graduation rate of the students who returned from Year 1 (the average on-time graduation rate for a community college student is typically 45%). Read the speech a thankful graduate gave: https://shorturl.at/xasKv.

The program chair, Sam Tevis, reports that this year's CNC Machining cohort is completely full for the first time in 7 years! The Technical Education Dean has been doing amazing work leading her team through new recruitment events and programs, but Sam credits the Tools for Tradespeople as a key reason why the machining program in particular is full. Spokane Colleges also announced the launch of two new manufacturing certificates, including a CNC Machining Operators Certificate. You can read more about that here: https://shorturl.at/lqmwt.
